Others have found themselves drawn here, looking for fresh air and the pleasures of the great outdoors. Whichever group you fall into we want you to know the Arboretum is doing all we can to serve you and to be ready for the day when we can all explore and celebrate nature together again.

In the last couple of years, the Arboretum has worked to make our programs and facilities feel more inclusive, equitable, and welcoming to everyone in the community. This year, we hoped to focus on stepping up the care of our trails and facilities, and broadening the scope of our educational programing – adding more hands-on stewardship activities for children and more classroom time to reinforce what kids learn on our fieldtrips. We also planned to engage more people of all ages in citizen science and to shine a local light on global issues like climate change.

All those things are still very important, and we still intend to achieve them, but the COVID-19 crisis has been a game changer for everyone, including the Arboretum. We've had to cancel this year's Wildflower & Music Festival as well as all of our spring programs and activities. Much of our summer events season will also be lost. We will experience significant impacts to our work, and to our funding as a result.

These challenging times have pushed us to find new ways to serve our mission and our community. On our website, you can now find fun educational activities to do with your kids, video classes, and opportunities to sign-up for virtual workshops. We're excited about these new offerings, but also eager to gather with you again, out in nature.


# Spring's Return

There was a thin yellow film on the hood of my car today. Looking for the culprit, I spotted the Oregon ash and bigleaf maples in bloom, festooned with pollen waiting for transport. When the maple trees flower, our blue camas lily is also coming into bloom. Both plants produce heavy nectar flows relatively early in the season; and as such, are valuable food sources for honey, leafcutter and mason bees.

Baby blue eyes (Nemophila menziesii)

are lush with dense spikes of blue camas and yellow buttercup darting up through the grass. Walking about one can see trilliums, bleeding heart, Oregon iris, and baby blue eyes that speckle the trails. Pink lady slipper orchids, a favorite of many, are back

beneath the incense-cedar trees. Hummingbirds and bumblebees dance between blossoms gathering nectar

from a patch of purple larkspur growing in the Water Garden. There is a female Wood duck back in the same oak tree cavity as last year brooding eggs, and there appears to be another duck nesting in an Oregon ash cavity not far from this tree

The wildflower season

is here. The meadows

out behind the Education Building.

While we all hunker down to aide in weathering this storm, the valley is decked out in its finest spring cloak. The woods and skies are alive with wild beauty and sounds of courtship. If you're feeling the need for a break, consider taking a walk to immerse yourself in nature's salve.
