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With schools heading on-line and no spring field trips, we created activities that matched state science standards for teachers to send out to their students. We were able to make at least one activity for each grade level. Since we couldn't bring students out to the Arboretum this spring, we brought the Arboretum to them with virtual field trips. Through short videos, students were still able to see some of the Arboretum and learn about local animals and plants.

Exhibits & Programs Update

Our Walks and Workshops program got off to a robust start in the first quarter of the year, with some of our highest-ever program attendance, and workshops scheduled for the spring and summer were filling before having been officially announced. Increased demand for these programs is a credit to our wonderful community of guides and instructors, some of whom are new, and others who have been leading walks for decades.

With the arrival of COVID-19 in our community in mid-March, all scheduled programs were cancelled and have yet to resume. In order to continue offering learning experiences during this

time, we've become more familiar with webinar platforms and video recording than we'd ever expected. These

virtual programs have been popular and well-received, with well over 100 people attending webinars thus far. However, this experience has illustrated just how powerful a classroom the Arboretum is. Learning is enhanced when it is immersive—the name of an unfamiliar wildflower is better remembered if learned on a warm day in early April when the air was thick with the honey smell of bursting cottonwood buds and the electric chirps of tree swallows filled the skies. Learning inside steals much of the context, and some of the magic. We look forward to a time when we can safely resume our nature walks.

Site & Facilities update: My First Spring

Starting my position, here at the Arboretum, I knew right away it was not going to be a normal spring. My first day, March 19th, we were already in the midst of a global pandemic. There was uncertainty as to whether the park was going to stay open, and I was coming into a position where I knew no one and had a new plant population to learn. (Where else in the valley do you have an Incense-cedar forest!).

As the first few days melted into weeks, I started to feel a bit overwhelmed and stressed due to all of the information I was taking in about the position and site. I also quickly realized that certain duties and perks that drew me to the position were not going to be happening in the foreseeable future; such as volunteer coordination, school programs, festivals, etc.. So, I had to take comfort in projects and tasks that could be accomplished in these weird times.

As the days passed, we (Tom, Jason, Josh, and myself) turned our lemons into lemonade by tackling tasks that would have normally set on the back burner because of higher-priority tasks like the Wildflower & Music Festival and leading volunteers. These projects included invasive and non-native plant control, and facilities updates to help combat Covid-19. Some of the notable projects we have been chipping away at are:

- Updating Howard's Bridge (across from the White Oak Pavilion)
- Installing paper towel dispensers and hand sanitizer holders in the pavilion area
- Cleaning and organizing the barn
- Removing a large chunk of scotch broom (Cytisus scoparius) in the Arboretum
- Hand pulling Maltese starthistle (Centaurea melitensis) in the Bonneville Power Administration corridor
- Servicing a number of machines used on site
